



Young people sometimes turn to pornography to understand what sex is.

It is natural to be curious but porn isn't the best source of information.

## Things to know

- Porn is not how people have sex or relationships it is not based on reality.
- Porn does not generally feature or model consent more often, it models exploitation, power imbalances and a very one-sided view.
- Consent is more subtle and is a process, not just a yes/no, and not just once. It is rare to see it in pornography.
- Most children who view pornography find it disturbing and aggressive, but suggest that it had influenced their sexual behaviours and expectations.
- Porn has been strongly associated with gender-based violence, racism, ableism and homophobia.
- Porn is increasingly shared, created and normalised amongst young people.
- It can be easily accessed through any smartphone or social media platform such as Snapchat, Tiktok, Instagram, etc.

## Did you know?
