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Writing Small Step Targets for Young Children SEND

Why write targets for young children with SEND?

Here are 7 of reasons why we would write small step targets for a child with SEND needs. Writing small step targets are integral to the **Graduated Approach response** for children with SEND.

- 1. Developing partnerships with parents
- 2. Showing progress
- 3. Sharing goals and activities with others
- 4. Identifying patterns of play and learning
- 5. Identifying next steps
- 6. Targeting areas of need
- 7. Celebration of success

<u>SMART targets</u> - SMART targets are small step targets that are:

- S specific, not open to interpretation
- M measurable, with clear language to describe observed learning and development
- A achievable, because they are fail safe in their approach.
- R relevant to the child and their family
- T Time Bound, using time, duration and frequency measures for success

The Four Elements to include in a Small Step SMART Target

It helps when writing a SMART target to do so on 4 different lines like below, to get all **4** elements included.

- 1. Who name of child
- 2. Does What what the child is observed doing (clear language using verbs) 3
- 3. Under What Conditions consider prompts, materials, instructions, context.
- 4. To what Degree of Success time, frequency and duration

Always start the 'Does What' with 'will' and the 'Under What Conditions' with 'when'

Examples of SMART small step targets

Who: Ella

Does What: Will press the top of the musical box to make it open

Under What Conditions: When an adult says, 'press the top' and points to the top of the box

To What Degree of Success: Ella will do this 4 times out of 5

Who: Joshua

Does What: Will put one brick on top of another brick,

Under What Conditions: When an adult says, 'Your turn, now my turn', with 8 bricks in total

To What Degree of Success: For up to 3 turns each

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Who: Alice

Does What: Will retell the beginning, middle and end of her bedtime story (Owl Babies) Under What Conditions: When mum shows her the pictures from the story (Owl Babies) To What Degree of Success: 5 out of 7 bedtimes

Who: JackDoes What: Will find his teddyUnder What Conditions: When mum asks, 'Where is Teddy?' and hides Teddy under a tea towelTo What Degree of Success: twice out 5 attempts

Who: Tommy
Does What: will say or sign 'drink'
Under What Conditions: When mum shows him the cup and signs and says 'drink'
To What Degree of Success: on imitation each snack time

Who: SallyDoes What: Will walk along the table, holding the edgeUnder What Conditions: When an adult supports her hips with their handsTo What Degree of Success: For up to 6 steps

Who: PatrickDoes What: Will sit on the floorUnder What Conditions: Without supportTo What Degree of Success: For up to 30 seconds

Who: Bobby Does What: Will catch the large ball Under What Conditions: When it's rolled towards him along the floor To What Degree of Success: 7/10 attempts

Who: Pam Does What: will walk forward 6 steps Under What Conditions: When her parent holds her hand and she is wearing her Piedro boots To What Degree of Success: 6 out of 8 tries
