CONSIDER (prior to review)

If an EP assessment is necessary
 i.e. Will the young person's needs require specific
 intervention/support for their chosen post 16 pathway?

If the young person's health needs will require
 and/or meet criteria going adulthood?

If there are any social care issues to be reviewed
 for the young person and their family. If they are
 looked after, what is the plan?

INVITE

Invite all those involved in planning the young person's
 pathway to adulthood:
 Family, health professionals, social care, Careers
 South West advisor, representative from post 16
 provider (see additional information overleaf)

REVIEW AND ESTABLISH

Review the young person's aspirations and the
 transition pathway plan

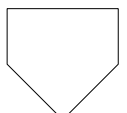

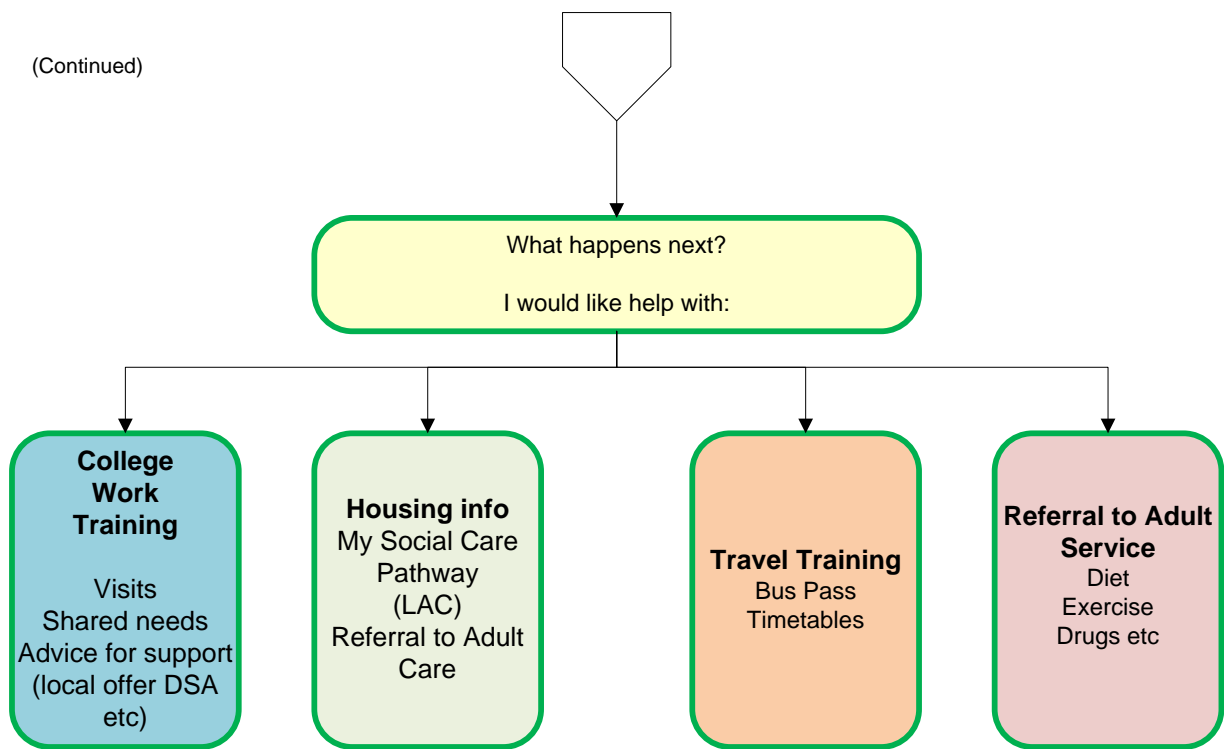

Additional Information for Year 11 young people

The Children & Families Act 2014 gives the onus of decision making to the young person. 'after compulsory school age (the end of the academic year in which they turn 16) the right to make requests and decisions applies to them directly rather than their parents'.
(SEND Code of Practice 8.15).

The Mental Capacity Act 2005 states that it should be assumed that anyone aged 16 or older has full legal capacity to make decisions for themselves (the right to autonomy) unless it can be shown that they lack capacity to make a decision for themselves at the time the decision needs to be made.
